

Knowledge and training on the practice of Green Sustainability in the Performing Arts began with a webinar on 21st March 2023 with the IETM Green School Kick Off Session. An new online initiative for concrete steps towards bringing change to our local professional contexts to enrich innovative practices and experiences.

In the run up to my time in Aarhus Denmark, I participated in the newly formed Environmental Working Group, which aims for a more sustainable and green future for the performing arts and focuses on making the arts sector a leading force in environmental processes. The webinar tackled the relationship between the European Green Deal and the Cultural and Creative sectors, and what type of support the European Green Deal can provide freelance artists.

Project Quantum was a new premise to demonstrate our values, and beliefs in being responsible and proactive in our freelance dance community, by making small-scale decisions and changes which matter, and ultimately impact our environment By addressing how we collaborate, we changed our daily habits in travel, food, clothing and commuting to lead by example.







Our Environmental Consciousness Report is in alignment and informed by the following: Sustainable Development Goals of the 2030 Agenda, GOAL 13 'Organise Climate Action' and GOAL 17, Build Partnerships for the Goals, European Green Deal, Julie's Bicycle, Sustainability Strategy for a CO2e and The Network Condition on Environmental Impacts of Digital Cultural Production (16/09/2021).

Key Themes, Quantum Code of Conduct:

Team travelling by reducing travel, reducing distance, reducing the number of people needing to travel and finding other creative alternative forms to touring. We introduced a tool to measure and compare climate emissions, to ensure we are actively combating the environmental impacts for project based activities.

Shrink our footprint of food:

- Consume local and seasonal products (forget strawberries in winter for example) and cooking as teams or groups for evening meals.
- Limit meat consumption, especially beef
- · Select fish from sustainable fishing
- · Bring reusable shopping bags and avoid products with excessive plastic packaging
- Make sure to buy only what you need, to avoid waste.

Dance Clothing:

- Take good care of your clothes on residencies, workshops etc
- Try swapping, borrowing or buying second-hand costumes

Transport:

- Use public transport Leeds and Ipswich
- Cycle Girona and Barcelona
- Be smart about when and how you drive Leeds
- Use trains to arrive to delivery our activities


By taking small steps in Quantum, we were able to measure and save some energy and money and help to protect the climate by reducing your emissions through a consciousness of environmental awareness.









